



### Striving to Take Advantage of the Difference Between Perceived and Real Risk in the Market.

The Princeton Adaptive Premium Fund seeks to use risk models in the selling of market hedges in the form of S&P 500 put options to collect premium. The strategy utilizes option contracts to attempt to generate a weekly profit. By utilizing historical market data, along with various current risk data points, the Fund seeks to take advantage of the difference between perceived and real risk in financial markets on a weekly basis.

#### **Definitions:**

A **Call or Put Option** is an agreement that gives an investor the right, but not the obligation, to buy or sell (respectively) a stock, bond, commodity or other instrument at a specified price within a specific time period. The **Strike Price** of an option refers to the price at which a call or put option can be exercised (put into effect). The **Expiration Date** of an option refers to the last day that the option is valid. The **S&P 500 Index** is a capitalization-weighted index of 500 stocks. The index is designed to measure performance of the broad domestic economy through changes in the aggregate market value of 500 stocks representing all major industries. The Total Return version of the index is shown. The **Bloomberg US Aggregate Bond Index**, a broad-based flagship benchmark that measures the investment grade, US dollar-denominated, fixed-rate taxable bond market. **Standard Deviation** measures the average deviations of a return series from its mean. **Sharpe Ratio** is a statistical measure that uses standard deviation and excess return over a risk-free rate of return to determine reward per unit of risk. A higher Sharpe ratio implies a better historical risk-adjusted performance. The Sharpe ratio has been calculated using the Citi 3-month Treasury Bill Index for the risk-free rate of return. The **Up Capture Ratio** is a measure of the manager's performance in up markets relative to the market itself. The **Down Capture Ratio** is a measure of the manager's performance in down markets relative to the market itself. **R<sup>2</sup>** is a statistical measure that represents the proportion of the variance for a dependent variable that's explained by an independent variable or variables in a regression model. **Beta** is a measure of the volatility—or systematic risk—of a security or portfolio compared to the market as a whole. **Maximum Drawdown** is the maximum observed loss from a peak to a trough of a portfolio, before a new peak is attained.
